- Medical room relocated to the front of the school, so two rooms side by side to make the monitoring of students more efficient. The isolation room will be used if any student becomes unwell during the day. It has outside ventilation with an outside door to limit the contact through the school building. All first-aiders have access to full PPE is available

- high traffic areas are cleaned more regularly and they can fog areas in addition to the regularly timetable.
- Staff and students provided with LFD kits to regularly test themselves daily after an outbreak or if school placed in Amber restrictions.
- Inform local authority and Croydon public health- following the agreed protocols (appendix a)
- Students sent home due to an outbreak will be provided with a LFT to use at home to check whether they develop covid and will be asked to take a test prior to returning to school.
- Students entering the 6th form will be surveyed to see how many took up the offer to be vaccinated.
- Depending on contact whilst on Amber restrictions those who live in the same house with someone who tests positive for covid will be asked to isolate.
- Close contacts of new variants will have to be isolated if non vaccinated. if school is on Amber restrictions this will include any siblings from the same household who attend school.
- Amber restrictions = return of year bubbles, face masks in all areas, one-way systems. in extreme cases if staffing levels low year bubbles working remotely.
- Co-curricular clubs within bubbles only.
- Over 18s are classed as adults and expected to be treated the same.

- Anyone (staff and students) who is self-isolating can and should be tested, once the test is negative they can return to school providing they do not have any symptoms
 School asks that anyone self-isolating or waiting for a test result keeps us as up to date as possible to ensure we can put track and trace measures in place
- Keeping school informed will enable us to reassure anybody that is concerned or anxious and we will ask for evidence to ensure we can keep the school as safe as possible and minimise the impact on others
- The school is now set up to conduct covid testing for small numbers of students & staff on a regular basis. additional risk assessments and training has been completed by all volunteers involved in the testing
- Omicron covid variant now means that all close contacts will have to take daily lateral flow tests before coming to school
- Low uptake of the 12-15 vaccination (impacted by the vaccination cancellation of the second session). Only 136/1265 students took the vaccine when offered
- Approximately 30% of students across the school refused lateral flow testing as part of the school's return school testing
- Some parental apathy towards testing, vaccination and the existence of Covid
- Not all members of staff are fully vaccinated, and the nature of classroom work means they must isolate if a student they teach is Covidpositive

- Beyond Amber restrictions would result in a potential school closure & move to remote schooling with the exception of vulnerable students and key staff required.
